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Introduction



Note: These release notes contain information that might not appear in the Help. Read them in their entirety before you install the product. This document may also contain a number of links to external Web sites. Micro Focus cannot be responsible for the contents of the Web site or for the contents of any site to which it might link. Web sites by their nature can change very rapidly and although we try to keep our links up-to-date, we cannot guarantee that they will always work as expected.

The Relativity product set enables the construction of a true relational database using existing COBOL application data. Relativity provides a full-featured, Windows Open Services Architecture (WOSA), Open Database Connectivity (ODBC)-compliant relational database engine. Thus, Relativity allows SQL-based client access to COBOL application data without moving, converting, replicating, or re-engineering COBOL data files.

With Relativity providing SQL-based access to COBOL data files, any ODBC-enabled database development application or tool can be chosen to build applications for ad hoc reporting, decision support, and specialized data processing functions. Relativity enables any working application to benefit from database technology without rewriting or migrating that application.

Relativity Products

The components detailed in the *Relativity Components* section are available within the following products:

Designer Suite

The Relativity Designer Suite is a Windows-only development tool which enables you to create Relativity databases. The Suite consists of the following components - the Designer, the Database Administrator, and the Data Manager.

You can import COBOL file record definitions into the database, and then create tables based on those record definitions.

Use the Database Administrator to maintain such things as the table connections, date constants, and character sets used in a Relativity database.

Relativity for Windows Workstations

Relativity for Windows Workstations is Windows-only run-time product and is a single-tier solution required when your ODBC application and COBOL data files reside on the same machine, and the ODBC application is a 32-bit program. Relativity for Windows Workstations requires a Relativity database that was developed using the Designer Suite.

Relativity for Windows Workstations contains the following components - Database Administrator and the Data Manager.

Use the Database Administrator to maintain such things as the table connections, date constants, and character sets used in a Relativity database.

Data Server

The Relativity Data Server is a run-time product which contains the Data Server for a specific platform (Windows or UNIX), and also a platform-specific Data Client.

It is a client/server solution required when your ODBC application is required to access COBOL data files that reside on another machine, or when your ODBC application is a 64-bit program. The Relativity Data Server requires a Relativity database that was developed using the Relativity Designer Suite.

This product also contains a Java Client, which is part of the client/server solution required by JDBC (Java Database Connectivity) applications.

Relativity Components

The Relativity product set consists of three main software components:

Relativity Designer

The Relativity Designer is an interactive, Windows-based tool that enables the COBOL application developer to define and maintain a relational database system of tables using COBOL data.

The Relativity Designer creates the Relativity catalog by performing the following functions:

- Automatically extracts the definitions of data files from the COBOL programs into the Relativity catalog.
- Collects information regarding the data from the application developer.
- Allows the developer to define relational tables from existing COBOL data items within records of existing COBOL files.

If an owner group has been assigned to the catalog, only users who are members of that owner group may open the data source associated with the catalog using the Relativity Designer. Assignment of an owner thus protects the sensitive data in the catalog exposed by the Relativity Designer from access by users who are not owners. A password-protected log on procedure validates user identities whenever a Relativity data source is opened, as explained in *Providing Data Security*.

Relativity DBA

The Relativity DBA (Database Administrator) is an interactive, Windows-based tool that enables the system administrator at the end-user location to maintain and manage the Relativity database and the security of the Relativity database.

The Relativity DBA provides the following functions:

- Defining and authorizing users of the database.
- Restricting the view of the data for individual groups of users.
- Maintaining the linkages between tables and physical COBOL data files.
- Defining date constants.
- Merging security and connection information into a new catalog (an optional function controlled by the catalog developer).
- Producing reports on security and connections.

The Relativity DBA can be used only by users who have the **Use Administrator** privilege set for the catalog, or by the catalog owner (who has all privileges set by default). The owner may grant this privilege to one or more administrative groups - see *Defining Group Privileges*.

Relativity Database Management System

The Relativity Database Management System (DBMS) connects Windows client-based tool products to COBOL data files. It processes SQL requests from the ODBC-enabled application (or tool) and performs the necessary actions to respond to the request with data obtained from the COBOL data files.

The Relativity DBMS comes in two variants: single-tier and a client/server. The single-tier product is named the Relativity Data Manager. The client/server product is named the Relativity Data Client and Relativity Data Server.

Relativity Data Manager

The Relativity Data Manager is a single-tier version of the Relativity DBMS. By single-tier, we mean that the product is installed on a single machine. In this configuration, the COBOL data files are installed on the same machine as the ODBC-enabled application and the Relativity Data Manager.

Relativity Data Client and Relativity Data Server

The Relativity Data Client and Relativity Data Server are a client/server version of the Relativity DBMS. In this configuration, the COBOL data files are typically not on the same machine as the ODBC-enabled application. In this case, the Relativity Data Client is installed on the same machine as the ODBC-enabled application, and the Relativity Data Server is installed on the same machine as the COBOL data files. The Data Server needs to be installed only once and on only the server machine, that is, the machine with the COBOL data files. The Data Client needs to be installed on each client machine that needs access to the data on the server machine. The Data Client sends the SQL requests from the ODBC-enabled application to the Data Server, which then processes the requests and returns only the resulting rows to the Data Client, which in turn returns them to the ODBC-enabled application.

New Designer user interface

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The Relativity Designer has been redesigned with modern user interfaces. The original Designer has been renamed to the Classic Designer and will also be installed in this release, and you can continue to use it; however, we encourage you to transition to the new interface, as the Classic Designer is expected to be removed in a subsequent release.

64-bit Data Server support for SUSE

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The Relativity Data Server for SUSE has been updated to run as a 64-bit process on SUSE 12. The RUNACTIVE script will determine if a 32-bit or 64-bit COBOL (either Visual COBOL or Server Express) is in use and launch the appropriate Data Server.

SQL_C_SBIGINT and SQL_C_UBIGINT support

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The ODBC 3 Relativity Data Manager and Data Client (but not the Relativity Data Manager for ADO, nor the Relativity Data Client for ADO) now support 64-bit C integers SQL_C_SBIGINT and SQL_C_UBIGINT.



Note: This does not include support for 64-bit (BIGINT) columns; however, DECIMAL(20,0) columns will contain a SQL_C_SBIGINT.

Foreign key support

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Relativity has been enhanced to support the ODBC API call `SQLForeignKeys`. The new Designer has the ability to designate a connection between columns in two different tables, creating foreign keys. These are columns that you usually use in joins. Adding this information allows SQL tools to optimize queries that they generate, and to present the foreign key association graphically.



Note: It is up to the SQL tool to make use of this information; Relativity does not directly use it, nor validate it. It is up to the database designer to make valid associations.

Support for Net Express and Server Express

You can now install and Relativity with either Micro Focus Net Express or Server Express.

See *Software Requirements* in these Release Notes for information about which versions of Net Express and Server Express are supported.

COBOL syntax files

The **COBOL FD Importer** within Relativity Designer invokes the COBOL compiler to generate information about a COBOL program's File Definition and saves it to COBOL syntax file. The wizard then reads the information from that file and imports it into the Relativity catalog.

The COBOL syntax files have a different extension based on which Micro Focus product you have installed Relativity for:

- .CST, if you use Relativity with either Visual COBOL or Enterprise Developer
- .RST, if you use Relativity with either Net Express or Server Express

A new ODBC driver

This release provides a new Relativity ODBC driver which is optimized for ADO support.

When you use Relativity with an ADO application, it is strongly recommended to use the ADO version of Relativity. To do this:

1. Open the ODBC Administrator and click **Add**.

This displays a list of all ODBC drivers installed on your machine.

2. Select a driver that is appropriate for your environment:

- Micro Focus Relativity Data Manager for ADO (32-bit)
- Micro Focus Relativity Data Client for ADO (32-bit)
- Micro Focus Relativity Data Client for ADO (64-bit)

Installation

System requirements

Hardware requirements

The requirements for this Relativity product are in addition to the requirements of the Micro Focus product you have installed - either Visual COBOL, Enterprise Developer, Net Express or Server Express. See the in-product documentation for details of the respective product's requirements.

Software requirements

This Relativity product requires one of the following Micro Focus COBOL development or deployment products.

- Visual COBOL or Enterprise Developer (including Development Hub and UNIX Components variants), version 5 or later.
- Enterprise Test Server, version 5 or later.
- Net Express 5.1 Update 18.
- COBOL Server or Enterprise Server, version 5 or later.
- Micro Focus Server 5.1 Update 18.

Other requirements

This product requires the latest version of the Micro Focus licensing software.

If you have one of the products listed above installed locally, you do not need to install the licensing software separately, as the product setup file also installs a new license server on the same machine.

Additional software requirements

To ensure full functionality for some Visual COBOL or Enterprise Developer features, you might be required to obtain and install third-party software in addition to the prerequisite software installed automatically by the product setup file.

Compiling Java

Refer to the *Additional Software Requirements* in the product documentation supplied with the COBOL product being used; this will stipulate the minimum required version of Java Development Kit (JDK) required to compile Java, if required, during the import and update processes.

JDBC Support

Refer to the *Software Requirements* in the product documentation supplied with the COBOL product being used; this will stipulate the minimum required version of Java Platform, Enterprise Edition (Java EE) required to execute the Java Client and develop a JDBC application.

Downloading the product

Use the download links in your Electronic Product Delivery email to download the required Relativity products.

For more information, follow the same links for the installation instructions and the End User License Agreement.

Restrictions and requirements

Before starting the installation on Windows, you should consider the following:

- If, when you install a Relativity product, the machine does not have the correct version of the Microsoft Visual C++ Redistributable Run-time already installed, it is installed as part of the Visual COBOL, Enterprise Developer, or Net Express install. This installation adds a number of .dll files, without digital signatures, into the `winsxs` directory.
- Your account must have administrative permissions to install this product. If your account does not have these permissions and cannot obtain them, you will be asked to provide the credentials of an administrator during the installation.

Installing Relativity Designer Suite



Note: Before installing, see *Restrictions and Requirements*.

This version of the product is a full install.

What to install

You need to install the following files, in the following order:

- The Data Manager install file - `DataManagerx86.msi`. See *Data Manager installation*.



Note: If you plan to use the Data Server product for communications, you do not need to install the Data Manager. Instead, you must install a 32-bit Relativity Data Client in order to communicate with the Data Server. See the Release Notes of Relativity Data Server for more information.

- The Designer install file - `Designerx86.msi`. See *Designer installation*.
- The Database Administrator install file - `DBAx86.msi`. See *Database Administrator installation*.



Note: This install is optional. Only install the Database Administrator if you require ongoing maintenance of Relativity databases.

Data Manager installation

 **Note:** The Data Manager is only available on Windows.

The Data Manager is one of the core pieces of the Relativity product. Either the Data Manager or a Data Server/Data Client must be installed in order to use the other Relativity products. The Data Manager is required in situations where the data files are located on the same Windows machine as the ODBC application, and the ODBC application is a 32-bit program. If either of these conditions is false, you will require the Data Server product instead.

The Data Manager requires an installation of other Micro Focus products in order to access data files. If the Data Manager is to be used with the Relativity Designer Suite in order to develop Relativity catalogs, Visual COBOL, Enterprise Developer, Net Express or Server Express must be installed on the same machine as the Data Manager. If the Data Manager is not to be used to develop catalogs, in other words it is being installed in a production environment, you only require an installation of COBOL Server, Enterprise Server or Micro Focus Server.

To install the Relativity Data Manager:

1. Run `DataManagerx86.msi` and follow the wizard instructions to install the prerequisite software and the product.
2. Following installation of the Data Manager, install a license using the Micro Focus License Administration; see *Installing licenses* in these Release Notes for more information.

 **Note:** You must also license the Micro Focus product you have installed Relativity for (either Visual COBOL, Enterprise Developer, Net Express, Server Express, Enterprise Server, COBOL Server, or Micro Focus Server) with its own license.

3. Following installation of a license, use the 32-bit ODBC Administrator to create a data source. The ODBC application will use the data source name to establish a connection to the Relativity Data Manager and a Relativity catalog, which contains information about a Relativity database. See *Data Manager Verification* for more information.

Designer installation

 **Note:** The Designer is only available on Windows.

The Relativity Designer is a program intended to develop and maintain Relativity databases. The Designer does not need direct access to the catalog file for the Relativity database. It performs its work through an existing data source, either through Data Manager or Data Client.

One of the Designer's functions is to import the definitions of file record layouts into the Relativity database. To do this, it requires access to a COBOL development system where it must be one of the following products - Visual COBOL, Enterprise Developer, Net Express or Server Express. The COBOL development system does not need to be installed on the same machine as the Designer; it can also use a development system that is installed on the same machine as a Relativity Data Server for UNIX. If your Relativity Data Server is for Windows, use the Visual COBOL IDE to produce a CST file locally and import the File Descriptions from that into the Relativity catalog.

The Designer is a 32-bit ODBC application, and will require a data source created by the Data Manager or the 32-bit Data Client that links to the Relativity database you want to maintain.

To install the Relativity Designer:

1. Run `Designerx86.msi` and follow the wizard instructions to install the prerequisite software and the product.
2. Following installation of the Designer, you need to create a 32-bit data source, as detailed in *Data Manager verification*. If you are creating a data source for an existing Relativity database, all that is

necessary is to create the required data sources and associate them with the database catalog file. If you are developing a new database, you must create a new catalog file at the same time that you create the data source; this catalog file must be located on the same machine as the data files, and for the sake of simplicity, in the same directory as the data files.

3. See *Importing COBOL File Definitions into Relativity* in the Relativity Designer Help for details on how to import the file definitions into a Relativity database, and then to create tables on those file definitions.

Database Administrator installation



Note: The Database Administrator is only available on Windows.

The Database Administrator (DBA) is a program intended to maintain a Relativity database after development. It does not require Visual COBOL or Enterprise Developer to be installed on the same machine.

The DBA is a 32-bit ODBC application used to maintain such things as the table connections, date constants, and character sets used in a Relativity database. It will require a 32-bit Data Manager or 32-bit Data Client data source to a Relativity database in order to maintain it.

To install the Relativity DBA:

1. Run `DBAx86.msi` and follow the wizard instructions to install the prerequisite software and the product.
2. Following the installation of the DBA, create a 32-bit data source, using either the Data Manager or 32-bit Data Client, in order to access and maintain the database; see *Data Manager verification* for more information.
3. See the Relativity DBA Help for details on how to maintain a Relativity database.

Installation verification

By verifying the installation of each product in the Relativity Designer Suite, you also undertake the initial setup.

The following instructions assume that you have run all required product installations for Relativity Designer Suite. It is useful to have an ODBC-enabled application, such as Microsoft Access, also installed to fully verify the installation.

Data Manager verification

After Data Manager is installed, you need to create a data source name to establish a connection to the Data Manager and the Relativity catalog.

1. Open the 32-bit ODBC Administrator (see *Locating the ODBC Administrator*).


The **ODBC Data Source Administrator** window appears.

2. Click **Add**.

The **Create New Data Source** window appears.

3. Scroll down through the list of installed ODBC drivers and select **Micro Focus Relativity Data Manager (32-bit)**, and then click **Finish**.

The **Relativity** window appears.



4. In the **Data Source Name** field, enter **Verify**.
5. Click **Select Catalog**.

The **Select Catalog for Data Source** window appears.

6. Navigate to %PUBLIC%\Documents\Micro Focus\Relativity Data Manager\Samples\MF\Verify.
7. Select `verify.rcg`, and then click **Open**.

The **Relativity** window appears.

8. Click **OK** twice to close the **Relativity** and **ODBC Data Source Administrator** windows.

At this point, the Relativity driver has been loaded, it has opened a Relativity catalog, and a Relativity database has been created. This has thoroughly exercised the installation; however, as an extra step, start a 32-bit ODBC application, open the Verify datasource, and then execute the following SQL query:

```
SELECT * FROM BACKORDER
```

The result should show the BACKORDER table that started life as a COBOL data file.

Designer verification



Note: This verification assumes that you have completed the Data Manager or Data Client verification, and have created the data source named *Verify*.

1. Start the Relativity Designer.

The Relativity Designer window opens.



Note: When you start Relativity Designer, you are prompted to open the last opened data source. If the **Database Logon** dialog box is displayed, click **Cancel**.

2. On the **File** menu, select **Connect to Existing Data Source**.

The **Open Existing Data Source** dialog box is displayed. (If you selected **Connect to <data source last opened>**, skip the next step.)

3. On the **Open Existing Data Source** dialog box, select the **Verify** data source, and then click **Connect**.

As the catalog associated with this data source has no security (that is, no group owner) configured yet, the catalog is opened immediately.

4. In the Catalog Explorer, double-click the **Table Definitions** node.

The BackOrder table definition is displayed.

5. Double-click the **Backorder** table definition.

6. Just above the table form, click  (**Preview Table Data**).

A preview of the table is displayed, showing how it would look in an ODBC-enabled application.

Locating the ODBC Administrator

The Windows ODBC Administrator is an important utility due to its role of creating data sources. You must open the correct version of the ODBC Administrator appropriate to the bitism of data source that you require.

Windows 7

On a 32-bit Windows machine:

1. From the **Start** menu, open the **Control Panel**.
2. Do one of the following:
 - If the Control Panel is displaying in **Category** view, select **System and Security**, and then **Administrative Tools**.
 - If the Control Panel is displaying in **Icons** view, select **Administrative Tools**.
3. Double-click **Data Sources (ODBC)**.

The **ODBC Data Source Administrator** screen appears.

On a 64-bit Windows machine:

Creating a 32-bit data source for the Relativity Data Manager or the Relativity 32-bit Data Client requires a 32-bit ODBC administrator on 64-bit Windows. Unfortunately, that is not the default ODBC administrator on a 64-bit Windows 7 machine. To start the required ODBC Administrator, follow one of the procedures below:

- To open the 32-bit ODBC Administrator:
 1. From the **Start** menu, in the **Search programs and files** box, type `odbc`.
 2. In the results box, double-click **ODBC Data Source Administrator (32-bit)**.

The **ODBC Data Source Administrator** screen appears.



Tip: To speed up access to this utility, right-click **ODBC Data Source Administrator (32-bit)** and select **Pin to Taskbar** or **Pin to Start Menu**.

- To open the 64-bit ODBC Administrator:
 1. From the **Start** menu, open the **Control Panel**.
 2. Do one of the following:
 - If the Control Panel is displaying in **Category** view, select **System and Security**, and then **Administrative Tools**.
 - If the Control Panel is displaying in **Icons** view, select **Administrative Tools**.
 3. Double-click **Data Sources (ODBC)**.

The **ODBC Data Source Administrator** screen appears.

Windows 10 and later

You start the desired ODBC Administrator from the **Start** menu - locate the **Administrative Tools** group (from the **Start** menu, you can start to type the group name and the option should appear), and then select **ODBC Data Sources (32-bit)** or **ODBC Data Sources (64-bit)**, depending on the type of data source to maintain.

Post-installation considerations

The steps you must perform after installation depend upon the location of the data files, if you are developing a Relativity catalog, and if you have an existing Relativity catalog or not.

Location of data files

- If the data files exist on a Windows machine, and the 32-bit ODBC application is installed on the same machine, you only need to create a data source using the Windows ODBC administrator.
- If the data files exist on a Windows machine, and the 64-bit ODBC application is installed on the same machine, you must create a server data source using the Data Server for Windows, and then create a client data source using the 64-bit Data Client that references the server data source. (There is not a 64-bit Data Manager.)
- If the data files exist on a Windows machine that is separate from the ODBC application, you must create a server data source on the Windows machine containing the data files, install the Data Client on each client machines containing the ODBC application, and then create a client data source on each that references the server data source.
- If the data files exist on a UNIX machine, you must create a server data source on the UNIX machine containing the data files, install the Data Client on each machine containing the ODBC application, and then create a client data source on each that references the server data source. (There is not a single-tier Data Manager for UNIX.)

Developing a new Relativity catalog

If you are developing a new Relativity catalog, you must install the Designer, and, if you do not have an existing catalog, create a new data source that references an empty catalog. Follow the directions in *Location of Data Files* for the type of data sources to create based upon the location of the data files.

In the case of development, the ODBC application is the Designer, and it must reside on a Windows machine, but note that it uses a data source to locate the Relativity catalog; thus, you will be able to develop with data files that are located on a remote server machine.

To develop a new Relativity catalog, see the Relativity Designer's help file for How-To information on developing the catalog.

Developing an existing Relativity catalog

If you are upgrading Relativity, and have an existing Relativity catalog, you only need to create a data source that references the existing catalog.

If you are installing this catalog at an end-user site, do not install the Designer; although you might want to install the Relativity DBA on an administrator's machine to allow maintenance of user IDs and catalogs. See the Relativity DBA's help file for How-To information on maintaining the catalog at an end-user site.

Uninstalling

Windows - all components

To uninstall one or more Relativity products from Windows:

1. Log in with the same user ID you used when you installed the product.
2. From the **Start** menu, open the **Control Panel**.
3. Do one of the following:
 - If the Control Panel is displaying in **Category** view, click **Uninstall a program** under **Programs**.
 - If the Control Panel is displaying in **Icons** view, double-click **Programs and Features**.
4. Select one of the following products and click **Remove** or **Uninstall**:
 - Micro Focus Relativity Data Manager
 - Micro Focus Relativity DBA
 - Micro Focus Relativity Designer
5. Click **Yes** to confirm.
6. If required, repeat from step 4 to uninstall further products.

This process only removes files that the installation software installed. If the product directory has not been removed, delete any unwanted files and sub-directories within it using Windows Explorer. The following folders might not be removed:

- The *Micro Focus product name* folder in the Start menu - you can delete this manually.
- %systemdrive%\Users\Public\Documents\Micro Focus - this includes the binaries and the log files of the samples you have built.
- %ProgramData%\Micro Focus - this includes some data files used by the Micro Focus licensing tool.
- %Program Files%\Micro Focus - you can delete this manually.

Some registry entries are also not removed by the uninstallation process and you need to manually delete them.

To uninstall a product from the command line, you need the installation file, and you need to execute the following command:

```
msiexec /x install-file.msi
```

Licensing information

To use Relativity, you need to purchase and install a license for it. To buy a license, contact your sales representative or Micro Focus SupportLine.

In addition, the Micro Focus product you have installed Relativity for (either Visual COBOL, Enterprise Developer, Net Express, Server Express, Enterprise Server, COBOL Server, or Micro Focus Server) must also be licensed with its own license.



Note:

- If you have purchased a license for a previous release of Relativity, that license will also enable you to use this release.
- Your entitlement for using this product is governed by the Micro Focus End User License Agreement and by your product order. If you are unsure of what your license entitlement is or if you wish to purchase additional licenses, contact your sales representative or Micro Focus SupportLine.

Relativity uses the Micro Focus License Administration software for installing and managing your Micro Focus licenses. See the instructions in the following sections about how to install the Relativity license.

To start Micro Focus License Administration

Windows 8.1

- From the Windows **Start** screen, click the **License Administration** tile

Windows 10 and Later

- From your Windows desktop, click **Start > Micro Focus License Manager > License Administration**

Installing licenses

You need either a license file (with a `.mflic` extension) or an authorisation code which consists of a string of 16 alphanumeric characters.

If you have a license file

1. Start Micro Focus License Administration.
2. Click the **Install** tab.
3. Do one of the following:
 - Click **Browse** next to the **License file** field and select the license file (which has an extension of `.mflic`).
 - Drag and drop the license file from Windows Explorer to the **License file** field.
 - Open the license file in a text editor, such as Notepad, then copy and paste the contents of the file into the box below the **License file** field.
4. Click **Install Licenses**.

If you have an authorization code

Authorizing your product when you have an Internet connection



Note:

- It is not possible to install licenses remotely. You must be logged into the machine on which you are installing the licenses.

The following procedure describes how to authorize your product using a local or network license server. The license server is set up automatically when you first install the product.

1. Start Micro Focus License Administration.
2. Click the **Install** tab.
3. Type the authorization code in the **Enter authorization code** field.
4. Click **Authorize**.

If you change the name of the machine running your license server after it has granted licenses, the licenses stop working.

Authorizing your product when you don't have an Internet connection

This method of authorization is required if the machine you want to license does not have an Internet connection or if normal (automatic) authorization fails.

1. Start Micro Focus License Administration.
2. Click **Manual Authorization** on the Install page.
3. Make a note of the contents of the **Machine ID** field. You will need this later.
4. Do one of the following:
 - If your machine has an Internet connection, click the SupportLine Web link in the Manual Authorization Information window.
 - If your machine does not have an Internet connection, make a note of the Web address and type it into a Web browser on a machine that has an Internet connection.

5. Type the authorization code in the **Authorization Code** field. The authorization code is a 16-character alphanumeric string supplied when you purchased your product.
6. Type the Machine ID in the **Machine ID** field.
7. Type your email address in the **Email Address** field.
8. Click **Generate**.
9. Copy the generated license string (or copy it from the email) and paste it into the box under the **License file** field on the Install page.
10. Click **Install Licenses**.
