

NetIQ® Sentinel™ Log Manager 1.2

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DEFINITIONS

"Collector Manager" means the component that manages data collection, monitors system status messages, and performs event filtering as needed.

"Collector" means a functional script or agent designed to collect, normalize and parse content from a variety of Devices. Collector includes collectors provided by NetIQ as well as collectors developed by or for You using the Collector Builder or Collector Software Development Kit (SDK).

"Collector Builder" means code with which Collectors can be built or modified using Sentinel's proprietary collector language.

"Collector Software Development Kit (SDK)" means the API with which Collectors can be built or modified using industry-standard languages.

"Device" means any single hardware device, program or application that Transports data or information directly to the Software, or indirectly to the Software through one or more Collector Managers.

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"Sentinel™ Log Manager Server" means the following Server Components collectively: Communication Server, Data Access Service (DAS), Database, Reporting Server, and Web Server.

"Type I Device" means a single server operating system, database, point-of-sale (POS), kiosk, ATM, or other similar device; security or network device (e.g., firewalls, intrusion detection systems ("IDS"), intrusion prevention systems ("IPS"), routers, switches, etc.). Devices or software that send their event logs to a management console/device/software or syslog server are counted by the number of primary source devices from which the logs originate. NetIQ applications/software and Microsoft Active Directory are also Type I Devices.

"Type II Device" means applications or operating systems on individual desktop computers (e.g., virus scanning per desktop), handheld/portable devices, card readers/scanners, or remote sensors (e.g., in a SCADA or other distributed monitoring/control system).

"Type III Device" means an Instance of vulnerability software (e.g., Nessus).

"Type IV Device" means non-security enterprise applications (e.g., enterprise resource planning (ERP) software, email, application delivery, etc.), and non-NetIQ log management appliances or software, but does not include syslog servers. Additionally, a Type IV Device includes any other device that doesn't qualify as a Type I, Type II, Type III, or Type V Device.

"Type V Device" means logical partitions (LPARs) to be monitored on mainframes (e.g., RACF, TopSecret and ACF2) and mid-range servers (e.g., AS400 or HP NonStop).

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
